What an interesting slogan that we often hear quoted during the holiday season: "Tis the season." The origin of this phrase dates back to 1862 and stems from the Christmas carol Deck the Halls. This lyric fills in the answer as to how we are to be during the current season; the answer is "jolly."

While being jolly is all well and good, I would submit that we should add in a new adaption of this slogan that reads, "'Tis the Season to Recapture the Glory of Christmas."

The word glory is fascinating, because of all the different thoughts that come to mind in people when asked what this word means. Glory is certainly something that we are to bring to the Lord by what we do in honoring Him, but just as important to know is the glory of the Lord stands for the unrestrained essence of God.

TWOB President Carl Tompkins was delighted to learn that a good number of Christian business owners were organizing in northern Idaho, wanting to become a formal association of members who's focus would be to help one another be successful in their business, serve the needs of their communities, and be Christ centered in all that they do. Carl has been asked to provide consulting services to this

new association of businesses, focusing on helping the members build a sound foundation to their association structure, provide training on various best business practices, and help connect them with multiple ministries and service groups in the greater Spokane and Coeur d'Alene areas. Having had a few meetings with the group, Carl believes that this association is off to a great start and will provide positive impact.

Let's Get Practical: What Have Been the Key Concepts and Discoveries in 2024

It was a most meaningful time interviewing TWOB President Carl Tompkins and learning what some of the most significant discoveries that he had during his work in 2024 along with key concepts that he taught in supporting various ministries, social services, and businesses. What I gained from Carl was most enlightening.

Right up front, Carl shared his pleasure in working with dozens of organizations this past year and how each meant well and worked hard in succeeding in their missions. This being said, he went on to discuss how much better our community would be served if more organizations worked together in unity. Specifically, he sited the occasion when he addressed fifty-one civic leaders at a luncheon stating that unity was an absolute must if the brokenness of community members was to be healed. "Absent unity, little if anything will be accomplished," was his quote. I then inquired, if unity is such a prerequisite, then why isn't it accomplished? His response was that unity requires strong leadership that causes people to stay the course. Secondly, any function requiring unity must be built around a well defined and written charter. Such a document causes participants to understand their mission, their role, as well as defining the scope of work to be accomplished. Moving onto the outcome of unity, I asked what good can be expected from people working as a team? Carl's first reply was that there is a better pooling and use of resources; essentially getting more done with less. A surprising component of resources, Carl went on to say, is better solutions based upon the diversity of attitudes, beliefs, and experiences held by the members of the coalition. Sadly, people fail to realize that the diversity of people is a strength rather that a reason to disband over differences. Carl stated a great quote on this subject: "No one person has the right answer, but everyone has the necessary input."

Having finished up on the topic of unity, I then moved to the question of what he has seen as a baseline necessity for organizations to succeed. He smiled and fired off with the response of the necessity of all organizations establishing clear vision, mission, and code of values statements. Absent these three foundational elements, organizations seem to spend a lot of time, effort, and money spinning their wheels, not getting anywhere. I asked for him to give a brief explanation of each. He explained that a vision statement is one sentence that defines the targeted outcome of an organizations existence. The mission statement defines how the organization will achieve the completion of their vision statement. Finally, the code of values is a listing of beliefs that regulate how the organization will operate; sort of a code of conduct. Carl concluded that much of his time this past year has been helping existing and new organizations complete this exercise.

In wrapping up my time with Carl, I asked what his own greatest discovery was for 2024. His answer was that through his twenty-six years working in the Spokane area, so many groups and organizations have stated that the Lord has something special in store for Spokane. Carl has been involved with numerous prayer summits where many in our community have gathered to pray for revival and healing of our city. Yet, little happens. Carl himself claimed to pray much and research why such a condition could exist. His discovery was 1 Chronicles 7: 14-15; verses that clearly define how we can be confident in God healing our land, by his own promise. Our four requirements are to humble ourselves, pray, seek God's face, and turn from our wicked ways. Carl has written and spoken much about this issue, namely that we can only conclude that we must do better meeting God's requirements if we expect God to hear our prayers and petitions.
